All roads, high and low, lead to Webster Groves Saturday, May 8, when the Scottish St. Andrew Society of Greater St. Louis and the City of Webster Groves present a first-of-its kind event here, the Scottish Highland Games. From 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Memorial Park, just South of I-44 at the Elm Avenue exit, will be filled with traditional ethnic activities that include seven competing Bagpipe Bands from throughout the midwest, folk dancers competing for top honors in the Sword Dance, Highland Lilt and others, and athletes tossing the caber, hurling beer barrels and throwing weighted stones for distance and height.

Visiting dignitaries and competitors will lead a parade down Lockwood Avenue to Elm at 10:30 a.m. Joining host Mayor John W. Cooper of Webster Groves will be British Consul-General to St. Louis Archibald Rendall and other city-county officials. Special games officials include Drum Major Norman MacKenzie of the Toronto Scottish Guard, chief steward for the Games, and Stuart Hamilton of KSD, honorary chieftan.

Field judges for events include Roderick MacDonald of Rutherford, Del., and A. "Sandy" MacPhee, Dunedin, Fla., piping; Mrs. Gladys MacDonald, dancing; Tim Orr, Kitchener, Ontario, drumming; and St. Louis' George Carson, sports commentator, and Alex Mackie, athletics adjudicator.

Special individual participants include champions Ms. Mary Beth Miller, Kansas City, who won the World Pipe Band Dancing Championship in Conley, England, as well as the Dancer of the Year honors at Games in Victoria, B.C. in 1975; Peter Hoyt, Orlando, Fla., who holds the world's record in the beer barrel throw and whose appearance here is sponsored by Anheuser Busch, Inc.; the Rev. Arnold Pope, ordained Methodist minister and teacher, Fayetteville, N.C., three-time United States winner of caber toss events and representative to the World Games in Aberdeen, Scotland in 1969,70 and '71; and Bill Bangert, St. Louis County, dubbed the "world's strongest"

WHAT ARE THE HIGHLAND GAMES?

Traditional Highland Games are promoted nationally by Scottish descendents in the United States to foster and restore interest in their ethnic dancing, piping, athletic achievements and Gaelic culture. They are "good fun" that unite Scots with their fellow citizens in a day-long celebration similar to summer festivities in the homeland where the hills echo with the wail of bagpipes, dancers perfect their costumes and steps to compete for individual and group honors, and athletes flex their muscles to become champions of such Scottish events as tossing the caber or stone, weight competitions and hammer throws. Pipe band march in kilts and tartans, and pipers and drummers seek honors for their skills.

The Webster Groves Highland Games are the first "true" games for St. Louis and the second in Missouri. Games abound wherein Scottish descendents abound and others scheduled for this year are in Alma, Mich., Kansas City, Chicago, and at Grandfather's Mountain, N.C. to name but a few.

Tossing the caber: coming to St. Louis to compete, the current American champion, The Rev. Arnold Pope of Fayetteville, N.C.

*The caber is a 20-foot long tree trunk, trimmed and peeled, at least 100# in weight (some exceed 200#). It is held vertically against the shoulder by grasping the thinner end; judging in this country is usually on distance thrown (but may also be on accuracy as in Scotland in relation to the 12 o'clock position). Each contestant has three tries.

Beer barrel throw: coming to St. Louis to compete is Peter Hoyt, world champion, from Orlando Fla. He set a record in Atlanta, Ga., of a 38'2" toss.

Tossing the stone, 22# hammer throw, 56# weight toss for height are among other athletic events.

St. Louis' chief competitor is Bill Bangert, whose prowess is legendary in Scotland for his feat in moving a replica of the famous Naha Stone weighing 7,342 pounds. On Sunday, April 4, at 1:30 p.m. at his home in Champ he is training St. Louis novices desiring to learn the art of tossing the caber.

WHAT IS THE ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY?

Founded Sept. 5, 1972 in St. Louis, the local society now numbers some 200 Scottish descendents who have settled in this area or friends of Scots who have traveled to the cities and Highlands of Scotland or have learned to love Scotsmen they meet, their brogues and their colorful traditions.

The local Society's objectives are to foster an exchange of culture, benevolences (profits from the Games will go to children's charities), educational and recreational pursuits and to encourage their enjoyment by other peoples in their communities. As in the homeland, all activities include entire families.
